(U.S. Mid-Atlantic Region, June 12, 2018) - From the battlefields that changed the course of the Civil War to the birthplace of the U.S. National Anthem to the Flight 93 National Memorial, the Mid-Atlantic is filled with places that have changed the course of U.S. history.

MARYLAND

Annapolis & Anne Arundel County

Annapolis was America's first peacetime capital. The Continental Congress met at Maryland's State House (the Capitol) November 1783-August 1784. Here, George Washington appeared before them to resign as commander-in-chief of the Continental army. Baltimore

Home to many historical sites, museums and figureheads, Baltimore is filled with American culture and heritage. Caroline County

In 1849, Harriet Tubman fled slavery from her parents' home at Poplar Neck in Caroline County. Five years later, she returned to lead her two brothers to freedom. Tubman's frantic rescue of her parents before they could be arrested for working as Underground Railroad agents was her last mission here. Charles County

Discover the legend of one of the 56 men to sign one of the important documents in World History-the Declaration of Independence. The Bush Declaration was signed mere weeks before the first shots were fired in the Battles of Lexington and Concord and more than a year before the Declaration of Independence.
